YOU SHOULD HAVE A PREPARED PIECE:

This may be either a traditional or standard tune, a transcription of a well-known artist's solo, an original tune, or your own arrangement of a less-traditional tune. This is the most important part of your audition. Give careful consideration in choosing a piece that you are comfortable with and that shows us your strengths.

IN ADDITION, YOU MAY BE ASKED TO PLAY SELECTED EXAMPLES FROM THE FOLLOWING LIST:

• Chords: These may include triads and/or seventh chords.

• Scales: One-octave major or minor scales.

• Ear training: Call-and-response exercises. The audition team will play short melodies or rhythmic

patterns that you will play back on your instrument.

• Reading:

1. Prepared reading: Included in this packet are reading examples that you can practice prior to

your audition.

2. Sight-reading: Short melodies written in standard notation (not tablature) or chord symbols with

specific rhythmic indications.

Improvisation: An improvised solo on blues changes in the key of your choice.
